Community engagement

Under Section 221 of the Local Government and Public Involvement in Health Act 2007, Healthwatch Havering has a statutory duty to ascertain the views of health and social care services and to make them known to the commissioners and providers of those services so that they can be taken into account in the development, commissioning and delivery of services.

We do this in a variety of ways, such as surveys, interviews and focus groups.

We also participate, with other Healthwatch organisations across North East London, in the Community Insights System, which gathers views and comments on health and social care from people across the area. Intelligence gained from Community Insights is used directly in, or to inform, many of the surveys and other public engagement events that we carry out.

The results of our community engagement are shared with Havering Council, NHS North East London, NHS and other provider organisations and Healthwatch England.

Proposed TfL Superloop bus service SL12:

Romford to Rainham via Hornchurch and St George's Health and Wellbeing Hub

Introduction

While the proposed Superloop service SL12 is very welcome, we are proposing an alternative route for the section between Roneo Corner and South End Road, to go via Hornchurch Town Centre and the newly opened St George's Health and Wellbeing Hub ("St George's Hub").

In association with providing a service to St George's Hub, we hope that it will be possible to provide bus stops nearer to it than any of the current stops listed above, especially given that many of the people attending St George's Hub as patients are of limited mobility.

The SL12 route

The route as proposed runs from Gants Hill, Ilford to Rainham in South Havering. It will run along the A12 Eastern Avenue from Gants Hill to North Street, Romford (passing King George Hospital, Goodmayes); thence to Romford Town Centre and Romford Station, then via Queen's Hospital to Roneo Corner, Hornchurch.





As originally proposed, it would then run via Upper Rainham Road and Elm Park Avenue to Elm Park Town Centre, thence along Rosewood Avenue and Mungo Park Road to the junction of South End Road and Cherry Tree Lane, before continuing to Rainham Town Centre, and finally to the Ferry Lane Industrial area.

Alternative route – Roneo Corner to South End Road

We propose an alternative route between Roneo Corner and South End Road. The principal objective of the alternative route is to provide a bus service linking:

- King George Hospital, Goodmayes
- Queen's Hospital, Romford and
- the Rainham/Beam Park area

with St George's Hub. Our route would also simplify connections for people from the eastern part of Havering (Upminster and Cranham) to the SL12 service and to St George's Hub in particular.

Our alternative route would run as follows:

Queen's Hospital, Romford - Roneo Corner Hornchurch Road (passing Harrow Lodge Park and

- Leisure Centre) Abbs Cross Lane (following the current service 365)
- Abbs Cross Lane Hornchurch Town Centre (following the current service 165)
- Hornchurch Town Centre Station Lane Hornchurch Station – Suttons Lane – St George's Hub – Airfield Way – South End Road (following the current services 252/256)
- > South End Road to Rainham (following the current services 165/365/372).

St George's Health and Wellbeing Hub

St George's Hub opened in late 2024 and provides a range of health and care services under one roof.

As well as a GP practice, there are outpatient and mental health services and convenient access to a range of health care professionals as well as faster access to blood tests, MRI, X-Ray, CT and ultrasound scans. It is also a major centre for kidney dialysis.

A wide range of voluntary sector organisations support the patients, residents and health professionals operating from St George's Hub, as well as a team of 100 volunteers weekly who "meet and greet" patients and visitors on arrival.

Including St George's Hub on the SL12 route will provide these people with easy public transport access to help continue their vital duties to our communities.

More services will be available in the future, including a new Community Diagnostic Centre, avoiding the need for extra visits to local hospitals. There is also a community café.

St George's Hub operates 7 days a week and is used by a widereaching range of individuals from our communities.

St George's Hub was deliberately provided with limited car parking facilities in the expectation that patients and staff would arrive and leave by public transport rather than car. The car park is now regularly full, and its use is restricted to four hours, which is not always convenient for those undergoing treatment.


Improved bus services would undoubtedly reduce the demand for car parking spaces and reduce patients' and staff anxiety that they would fall foul of the four-hour restriction. ¹

The map on the following page shows the currently proposed route (in green) and our alternative route (in red), with the location of the St George's Hub marked.

Bus services currently serving St George's Hub

Two current bus services serve St George's Hub directly:

- 252, which runs from Collier Row to Hornchurch Town
 Centre via Romford Town Centre and Elm Park, and is a very
 circuitous route (the Elm Park portion of which would be
 followed by the currently proposed SL12 service), and
- 256, which runs from Noak Hill/Harold Hill via Harold Wood and Hornchurch Town Centre to Miramar Way, near St George's Hub

Both services call at stops in Suttons Lane that are some distance from St George's Hub:

- Vaughan Avenue stop A (southbound) (252/256): c.140m
 distant
- Vaughan Avenue stop E (northbound) (252/256): c.160m distant
- St George's stop B (252 only): c.220m distant and
- Miramar Way stop C (252/256): c.410m distant

In every case, the distance from the bus stop to St George's Hub is inconvenient for people of restricted mobility.

Neither of these services provides bus links to Queen's Hospital, Romford (nor King George's Hospital, Goodmayes).

Another bus service, **193**, passes near to St George's Hub but its nearest stop is in Vaughan Avenue, some 220m distant. The 193 goes to Queen's Hospital but by a circuitous route.

There is no bus route between St George's Hub and the Rainham and South Hornchurch areas (including the Beam Park major development area).

By contrast, the Elm Park area through which SL12 would be routed, is already served by bus services 165, 365 and 372, of which 165 and 365 also serve both Rainham and Romford (although the routes they follow are different); the 372 serves Rainham and terminates at Hornchurch Town Centre. Mungo Park Road can become congested at times, which would adversely affect the SL12 service's timekeeping. The alternative route is not, generally, congested; the main "pinch point" is a partially-pedestrianised area in Hornchurch Road between its junctions with Billet Lane and North Street, a distance of about 360 metres – but that is already used by existing buses without major difficulty.

Advantages of the alternative route

We consider that the advantages of the alternative route are that it would:

- Serve Hornchurch Town Centre, a more populous area and major local town centre (when compared with Elm Park).
- Serve Hornchurch Station rather than Elm Park Station (both served by District Line trains, and adjacent on that line).
 Although fewer passengers use Hornchurch Station than Elm Park Station, the latter already has a better bus service.
 SL12 would improve public transport services for those travelling to and from Hornchurch Station by bus.
- 3 Serve the St George's Hub, a major health facility that serves a much wider area than its immediate locality with patients drawn from a wide area, including patients undergoing kidney dialysis.

The route as proposed would already serve King George Hospital, Goodmayes and Queen's Hospital, Romford, from both of which patients are likely to be referred to the St George's Hub; it is therefore logical that SL12 should also serve St George's Hub.

- Improve access to St George's Hub from the Rainham area (there is currently no direct bus route to it from Rainham).

 SL12 will pass the Beam Park major development area and thus provide a link between there and St George's Hub.
- Provide a better service to Harrow Lodge Park and Leisure
 Centre, Hornchurch and Hornchurch Country Park. While the
 originally proposed route for SL12 passes both parks, our
 proposed route offers better access to them both (and the
 original route would not serve the Harrow Lodge Leisure
 Centre, to which people are directed for health and
 wellbeing activities).
- By serving Hornchurch Town Centre, it will make is easier for residents from the eastern side of Havering, from Upminster and Cranham, to access St George's Hub as bus services from those areas run through the Town Centre on the way to Romford.
- Reduce the use of cars by patients able to use a direct bus service to access St George's Hub, reducing unnecessary caron emissions and supporting the move to public transport.

The need for improved bus stop arrangements in Suttons Lane

Irrespective of whether the proposed alternative route for SL12 is accepted, there remains a need for improved bus stop arrangements in the vicinity of St George's Hub.

When granted planning permission, St George's Hub was deliberately provided with limited car parking facilities in the expectation that patients and staff attending there would arrive and leave by bus. As noted above, however, none of the current bus stops are near to it – the closest is 110 metres away and the furthest are 220 metres, distances which are difficult for people of limited mobility to negotiate – which entirely defeats the object of limiting the provision of limited car parking facilities at St George's Hub in favour of public transport.

There is, therefore, need for a bus stop in the immediate vicinity of St George's Hub.
